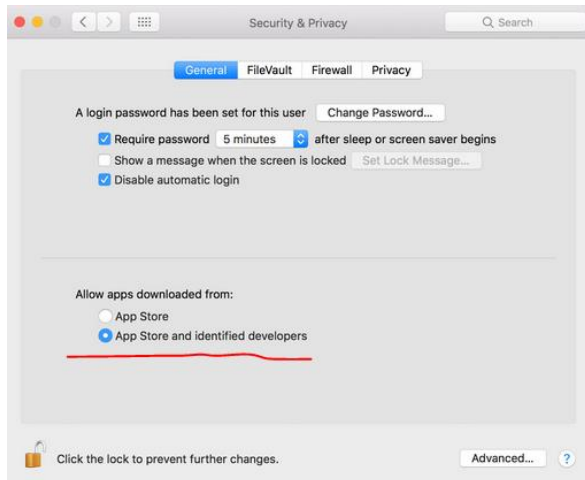


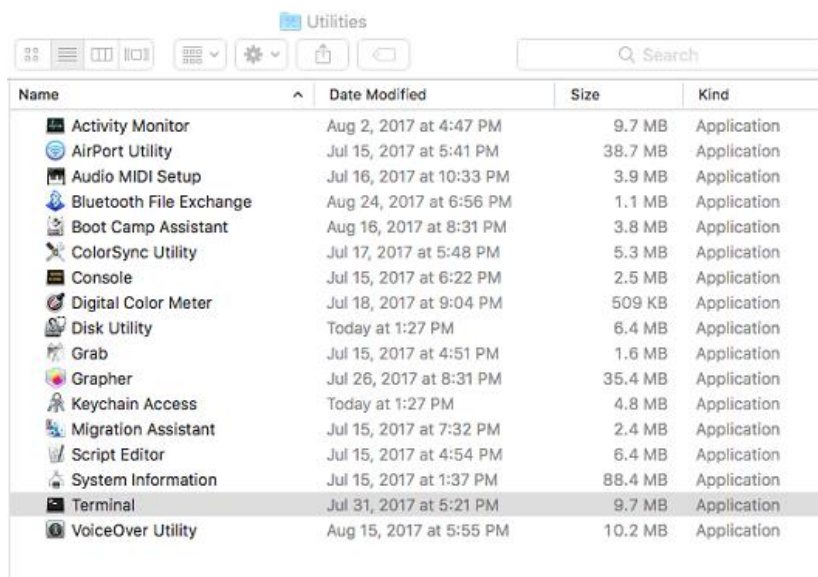
On newer versions of Mac Operating systems (MAC OS 10.12+), there is a Mac Security Feature called Gatekeeper. It is designed to prevent users from launching potentially harmful applications. As a result, the Control Center software might not install after you download it. To install the Control Center, we will have to temporarily disable Gatekeeper.

Go to your System Preferences, Security and Privacy.

You will see the following under “Allow apps downloaded from:”. These are the default settings.



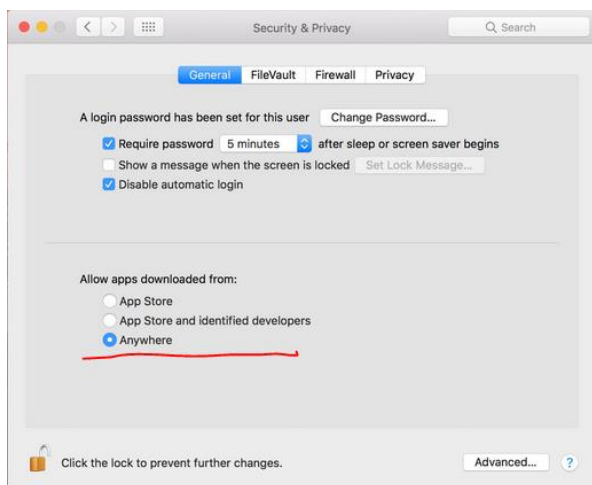
Now, close System Preferences. Go to your Utilities and launch “Terminal”



In the terminal command, type “sudo spctl --master-disable”, followed by your admin password when prompted. Note it is “SPCTL” in lower case.

Now, go back to System Preferences. You will now see this under “Allow apps downloaded from:”



Select the lock in the lower left corner so you can make changes and check “Anywhere”. It will prompt you with a warning, please select “Allow from Anywhere”. After that, close this window and run the downloaded Control Center file and software should now be allowed to install.

On some newer versions of Mac OS, there is one extra step: After you install the Software and it reboots, go back to Security & Privacy. There will be an “Open Anyway” or “Allow” option listed for KCODEs. Allow this and quit and restart the Control Center.

To restore Gatekeeper settings to default, do the following

Go to your applications and launch “Terminal”

In the terminal command, type “sudo spctl --master-enable”, followed by your admin password when prompted. Note it is “SPCTL” in lower case.
